



#### Thanks to your support, 2018-19 was an amazing year for Hill Learning Center.

We empowered thousands of students and educators in the Triangle, across North Carolina, and beyond. We lived into our new brand and expanded vision to ensure ALL children with learning and attention challenges receive the instruction and support they need - regardless of where they attend school or whether they have a formal diagnosis.

It is impossible to adequately express my gratitude to all of the donors, partners, parents, educators, and students who make up the community that is Hill Learning Center.

Two things I know for sure: we are better together, and we need all of you as we continue to increase our impact.

It is equally difficult to chronicle all you helped us accomplish last year, but here are a few highlights:

- ♣ Hill School provided individualized instruction and support to 186 courageous K-12 learners representing 70 area public, private, and home schools - our biggest year yet.
- Thanks to you, our successful financial aid campaign expanded access to Hill School, Summer, and Tutoring, and boosted partnerships with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Durham and Orange Counties, Durham Public Schools, and Students To Scholars.
- ♦ 1,252 educators participated in Hill Professional Development, and 274 of them enrolled in more than one training

- In collaboration with the NC Department of Public Instruction, we provided literacy training to 336 distric leaders and teachers from 99 NC school districts and 14 charter schools
- More than 500 teachers used the Hill Reading Achievement Program (HillRAP) Digital iPad app to teach 5,000+ struggling learners to read in 35 NC public school districts and 7 states.
- Through new partnerships with KIPP Delta in Arkansas and The Dyslexia Resource in Atlanta, we teamed up to provide technology and research-based reading instruction to students growing up furthest from opportunity.
- Curriculum Pathways®—provided by SAS contributed pro-bono software development services to make the Hil Learning System an even better technology tool for educators.

Your gifts also enabled investment in our faculty and staff, upgrades to our campus and infrastructure, and expansion of diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives with our employees and board of trustees.

Because of you, we have accomplished all of this, and more, on behalf of the 1 in 5 students with learning and attention challenges. Thank you for your belief in their success, your commitment to their growth, and your support for their unique strengths. We truly are better together.

It starts here. It continues only with your help.




### WHY YOUR SUPPORT MATTERS \_\_\_

### **Every Gift Makes A Difference**

A significant portion of the operating budget-23 percent-is covered by gifts to our annual fund, gifts for special projects, and income from endowment funds. Your contributions make a huge impact on our community; the quality of our people, programs, and trainings; and the continued financial viability of Hill Learning Center. Last year we received over \$1.6 million in contributions, including more than \$430,000 in unrestricted gifts and grants.

#### Gifts to Student Financial Aid

Gifts to student financial aid provide families in need with essential financial support to make attending Hill School possible. In 2018-19, \$278,295 was awarded to 33 qualified families. We send special thanks to all 532 donors who contributed to the Wendy B. Speir Student Financial Aid Fund challenge and the 2019 Hill Mile.

At Hill we persistently try to address barriers to access—for students and for teachers. One way we do this is by awarding scholarships to teachers for our professional learning opportunities. Too often, teachers must pay for their own continuing education; many schools and districts have severely limited budgets for the training teachers need to improve their skills. The more scholarship dollars we can provide, the more teachers can learn, grow, and ultimately empower the students in their classrooms. Last year donors contributed \$38,000 providing scholarships to 199 teachers.

### **Gifts to Partnerships**

Collaborating with public school districts requires a creative funding model, and it is the projects that have support from within their community that ultimately make the most progress and benefit the most students. An individual, foundation, or group of community leaders can be the catalyst for change. Investments in our district partnerships have funded HillRAP training and tutoring, individualized coaching, and technology purchases. Individuals and foundations contributed \$578,000 to our partnerships, helping us serve students, teachers, and schools in 35 school districts and 7 states.

- Hill's supporters celebrated Wendy Speir's 38 years of service by contributing to the Wendy B. Speir Student Financial Aid Fund challenge, ultimately raising \$358,000 for families in need.

### On the Rise

Thanks to your incredible outpouring for Hill Mile and the Wendy B. Speir Student Financial Aid challenge, we raised \$358,000 to help more families in need enroll at Hill School. Your generosity allowed us to expand our 2019-20 financial aid budget to \$365,000, a 31% increase over last

year. An additional \$10,000 in gifts provided our first ever scholarships for students to participate in Hill tutoring classes and summer programs. With this foundation and continued support from donors, we aim to expand access to Hill Student Programs each year.

\$10,600 provided 50% tuition assistance to a qualified student



### The Other 1 in 5

There's another 1 in 5 in our population, and that's the 1 in 5 general education teachers that feel "very well prepared" to teach students with mild to moderate learning disabilities, including ADHD and dyslexia\*.

Educators deserve better. That's why Hill's professional development offerings

are designed to empower teachers with skills and tools to reach the struggling learners in their classrooms.

From Hill's own signature workshops over 30 each year - to guest presenters, online courses, and virtual tools within the Hill Learning System, Hill is dedicated to supporting teachers.

\$1,900 provided one teacher with HillRAP training and coaching, and one year of access to the Hill Learning System, including use of the HillRAP App with an unlimited number of students.
